Programme information and content

Part 1:

The programme aims to provide you with subject-specific knowledge and more general skills. It will enable you to develop creative writing skills, and to exercise creative writing skills appropriate to the demands of various forms. You will also gain knowledge of a variety of different kinds of literary, dramatic and film texts, from a range of different periods. You will become familiar with the variety of critical perspectives and analytical methods within and between the disciplines. The course aims to foster an independent approach to formulating problems and arguments, using the close reading and analytical skills that are fundamental to the disciplines of English Literature and of Film. During your degree, you will encounter works that will stay in your memory and enrich your life for a long time after you leave us. The course also incorporates the study of television which can be made a larger or smaller part of your studies according to the options you pursue. Many of our alumni work in the creative industries, with roles in arts administration or film production. Graduates also go on to work in commercial marketing and media, advertising, journalism, and teaching.

In **Creative Writing,** Part 1 introduces you to writing in a variety of forms, and to debate approaches to the study of literature, through critical and research exercises and close study of selected texts from a number of different periods.

In **Film,** Part 1 introduces you to the academic study of film and moving image culture across a range of approaches and practices, instilling foundational terminology and key disciplinary debates. You will get the

opportunity to engage with the discipline both theoretically/critically and

	practically, learning the scholarly protocol of formal essay-writing and being able to choose an induction in the safe and appropriate use of filmmaking facilities and equipment.	
	In Creative Writing , Part 2 gives you an opportunity to develop your knowledge and skills, focusing on various forms individually. It provides you with greater breadth of coverage, and studies texts within historical periods and generic traditions.	
Part 2:	In Film , Part 2 provides opportunities to develop students' understanding of film and moving image culture through the discovery and investigation of particular issues explored via in-depth discussions across lectures, seminars and workshops. You will begin the process of identifying a dissertation or Creative Research Project topic, leading to an increasingly confident use of study resources and scholarly methodologies.	
Placement/Study abroad year:	Professional Placement Year and Study Abroad opportunities are available between Parts 2 and 3.	
Part 3:	In Creative Writing, Part 3 gives you the opportunity to master your knowledge and skills. You will undertake more specialized and independent literary study, choosing your modules from a wide range of options. The dissertation module develops your skills in research, planning and writing.

- To value personal, social, civic, and global perspectives, looking beyond any immediate task or question to its wider contexts.
- To demonstrate knowledge and understanding of film and television from a range of genres, practices and contexts
- To apply knowledge and understanding of a range of methods and approaches for the practical, creative, critical, theoretical and/or historical analysis of film and television.
- To combine the close analysis of film and television texts with the understanding of relevant socio-cultural, political, historical, ecological and/or industrial/production contexts.
- To undertake independent research to construct an argument through practical and/or analytical work.
- To demonstrate an ability to bring critical thinking and creative practice into a sustained and mutually beneficial relationship.

You will be expected to engage in learning activities to achieve these Programme learning outcomes. Assessment of your modules will reflect these learning outcomes and test how far you have met the requirements for your degree.

To pass the Programme, you will be required to meet the progression or accreditation and award criteria set out below.

Study Abroad

By the end of the Study Abroad Programme, students will have adapted to international study contexts in order to achieve the required academic outcomes determined by the host institution.

Placement

By the end of the Placement Year Programme, students will have explored and developed their professional experience, skills and knowledge, contributing significantly towards their continuous learning and career prospects as graduates.

Module information

Each part comprises 120 credits, allocated across a range of compulsory and optional modules as shown below. Compulsory modules are listed.

Remaining credits will come from optional modules in the Department of English Literature. Students must select 60 credits from the Department of English Literature and 60 credits from the Department of Film, Theatre and Television. Up to 20 credits of optional modules may be substituted for modules available from an approved list.

Students must select 60 credits from the Department of English Literature, at least 40 credits of which are to be taken from a list of modules in Creative Writing. Students must select 40 credits of optional modules in Film, Theatre and Television. Up to 20 credits of optional modules may be substituted for modules available from an approved list.

Modules during a placement year or study year (if applicable):

Students on one of the 4-year programmes will take one 120 credit module in either Work Experience or Study Abroad. Students may be permitted to undertake a placement year or a study abroad year between Part 2 and Part 3 of the programme. In such cases students will transfer to a 4-year programme. The placement or study abroad year should not normally be shorter than nine months full-time.

If you take a year-long placement or study abroad, Part 3 as described below may be subject to variation.

Part 3 Modules:

Students must select one 40 credit dissertation or Creative Research Project module.

Students must select 40 credits of optional modules from a list of modules provided by the Department of English Literature. Students taking FT3CRP OR FT3DISS must select 40 credits of modules in Creative Writing.

Students must select 40 credits of optional modules in Film, Theatre and Television. Up to 20 credits of optional modules may be substituted for modules available from an approved list.

Placement opportunities

Placements:

You may be provided with the opportunity to undertake a credit-bearing placement as part of your programme. This will form all or part of an optional module. You will be required to find and secure a placement opportunity, with the support of the University.

Study Abroad:

You may be provided with the opportunity to undertake a Study Abroad placement during your programme. This is subject to you meeting academic conditions detailed in the programme Handbook, including obtaining the relevant permissions from your School, and the availability of a suitable Study Abroad placement. If you undertake a Study Abroad placement, further arrangements will be discussed and agreed with you.

Optional modules:

The optional modules available can vary from year to year. An indicative list of the range of optional modules for your programme can be found online in the Course Catalogue. Details of optional modules for each part, including any additional costs associated with the optional modules, will be made available to you prior to the beginning of the Part in which they are to be taken and you will be given an opportunity to express interest in the optional modules that you would like to take. Entry to optional modules will be at the discretion of the University and subject to availability and may be subject to pre-requisites, such as completion of another module. Although the University tries to ensure you are able to take the optional modules in which you have expressed interest this cannot be guaranteed.

Teaching and learning delivery:

In Creative Writing, you will be taught through a combination of lectures, workshops, seminar discussion and portfolio tutorials. The dissertation module is supported by workshops and individual supervision. In Film you will be taught through lectures, seminars, supervision tutorials and, depending on your specialisation and module choices, practical workshops and tutorials using our specialist equipment and facilities.

Total study hours for each Part of your programme will be 1200 hours. The contact hours for your programme will depend upon your module combination; an average for a typical set of modules on this programme is Part 1 - 252 hours, Part 2 - 144 hours, Part 3 - 144 hours. In addition to your scheduled contact hours, you will be expected to undertake guided independent study. Information about module contact hours and the amount.

Elements of your programme will be delivered via digital technology.

The scheduled teaching and learning activity hours and amount of technology enhanced learning activity for your programme will depend upon your module combination. In addition, you will undertake some self-scheduled teaching and learning activities, designed by and/or involving staff, which give some flexibility for you to choose when to complete them. You will also be expected to undertake guided independent study. Information about module study hours including contact hours and the amount of independent study which a student is normally expected to undertake for a module is indicated in the relevant module description.

Assessment

In Creative Writing, assessment is conducted through a mixture of assessed portfolios, essays and formal examination. In Film you will be predominantly assessed through coursework. Depending on your module choices and specialisation, coursework may include essays and other forms of writing (such as learning journals or blogs), projects, practical work accompanied by documentation, videographic criticism, and presentations which may be accompanied by reflective reports.

Progression

Part 1

To achieve a threshold performance at Part 1, a student will normally be required to:

- (i) Obtain an overall average of 40% over 120 credits taken in Part 1;
- (ii) Obtain a mark of at least 40% in individual modules amounting to not less than 80 credits taken in Part 1; and
- (iii) Obtain marks of at least 30% in modules amounting to 120 credits.

In order to progress from Part 1 to Part 2, a student must achieve a threshold performance.

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 1 qualifies a student for a Certificate of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.

Students on joint honours programmes who achieve the University threshold standard for progression at Part 1 may transfer to a single honours degree in one of their joint subject areas if they have achieved at least 40% in 40 or more credits (i.e. 2 x 20 credit modules) of modules in the programme they wish to transfer. In addition, students must also have met any programme specific requirements on the single honours programme to which they may wish to transfer. Students should seek advice about the titles of programmes they may be eligible to transfer to.

Part 2

To achieve a threshold performance at Part 2, a student shall normally be required to:

- (i) Obtain a weighted average of 40% over 120 credits taken in Part 2; and
- (ii) Obtain marks of at least 40% in individual modules amounting to at least 80 credits taken in Part 2; and
- (iii) Obtain marks of at least 30% in individual modules amounting to at least 120 credits, except that a mark below 30% may be condoned in no more than 20 credits of modules owned by the Department of Mathematics and Statistics.

In order to progress from Part 2 to Part 3, a student must achieve a threshold performance.

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 2 qualifies a student for a Diploma of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.

Professional/placement year

Students are required to pass the professional placement year/study abroad year in order to progress on the programme which incorporates the professional placement year/study abroad year. Students who fail the professional placement year/study abroad year transfer to the non-placement year version of the programme.

Additional costs of the programme

During your programme of study you will incur some additional costs. For textbooks and similar learning resources, we recommend that you budget between £150 to £250 a year. Some books may be available second-hand, which will reduce costs. A range of resources to support your curriculum, including textbooks and electronic resources, are available through the library. Reading lists and module-specific costs are listed on the individual module descriptions.

In Film you will incur costs for theatre, cinema and/or gallery trips linked to Department modules and module assessments. These visits are an essential and very enjoyable part of your studies. We recommend that you budget between £60-to £100 for this per year. We secure discounted tickets in good seats through group booking, and travel costs can be significantly reduced by booking well in advance, travelling off-peak, and using Group Travel discounts and a 16-25 rail card. To help reduce costs, we also include visits to venues in Reading and Oxford as well as London where appropriate, and we invite practitioners to the department to perform/exhibit work and hold workshops and master classes for our students.

You are not required to purchase any practical equipment, as the Department provides the necessary equipment and facilities. If you require specialist materials for practical work, a technician will source this for you, following consultation with the relevant academic member of staff.

If you take part in Study Abroad you should expect to pay for services which you would normally expect to pay for at Reading e.g. housing, food, travel, social activities, etc. Additional costs will vary depending on the host institution and location. Please see the Study Abroad website for further details.

Costs are indicative and may vary according to optional modules chosen and are subject to inflation and other price fluctuations. Estimates were calculated in 2024.
